Our November branch meeting will be a joint meeting with Seattle AAUW, to hear Marilyn Morgan, author of Trailblazing Black Women in Washington State.


Sandra Distelhorst submitted questions for the <u>candidate forums</u> hosted by the League of Women Voters of Snohomish County, on issues important to AAUW.

Public Policy Updates

Most of our Edmonds-SnoKing Branch members reside in Congressional District 1 (CD1) or Congressional District 2 (CD2). (Want to know which districts you live in? Here's a quick way to find out. Also, our branch member directory lists the LDs and CDs for all our members.)

The new 2022 AAUW Head-to-Head Candidate Comparison is a good way to get to know congressional candidates' positions on key AAUW issues. It will also set the stage for our advocacy work in 2023-2024.

The Washington State district worksheets provide a member-friendly summary of federal issues that AAUW will be working on in the 118th Congressional session. It includes sample questions to ask candidates if we don't know their position.

AAUW-WA has an opportunity to publish Head-to-Head comparisons for key races, compiled by our members, on the national AAUW website. We are working on a final draft for the Senate race (Murray vs Smiley), for CD3 (Kent vs Perez), and for CD8 (Schrier vs Larkin). If you want to help with a comparison for CD1 (DelBene vs Cavaleri) or CD2 (Larsen vs Mathews), let me know. I need at least two members from a district to review the official scoring before we can publish the Head-to-Head Candidate Comparison on the AAUW Washington State and AAUW National websites.

AAUW updated the Voter Education webpages. There is a new 2022 <u>Voter Issue Guide</u> and one-stop shopping for <u>AAUW Quick Facts</u>. We can use the new <u>Letter to Editor Resource Guide</u> after the elections to highlight the importance of support for AAUW issues in our communities.

Don't forget to use the 2022 Head-to-Head Candidate Comparison template when you watch the candidate forums coming up in October. Use the Federal Head-to-Head template for congressional races. Use the State Head-to-Head template for all other races.
