

Public Policy Updates and Actions

Please join us at the Candidates Picnic on October 5th. It's your chance to chat with Snohomish County candidates and other local candidates.

Meetings with politicians are becoming an important component in our evolving democracy, according to Dr. Gina Masullo who spoke at AAUW-WA's Opportunity Matters webinar on September 12th. See New Town Hall: Why we engage personally with politicians.

event. I was surprised to see the "candidate conversations" hosted by MyEdmonds News and ECA on October 12th is charging a fee to attend.

Should we have to pay to meet candidates or attend a debate? How does that impact access to democracy?

We've talked at AAUW about privatization of schools (<u>Wolf at the School House Door</u>) and privatization of healthcare including Medicare. Do we need to start talking about privatization of elections and voter information?

What free sources of voter information are available?

The Voter Pamphlet information is sent free to all registered voters. It can be a helpful snapshot, although important to know the information is submitted by the candidate and not verified. Some candidate credentials have been questioned by local news sources. Other candidates have been called out as "stealth" candidates who do not make their strong position on controversial issues apparent, or intentionally hide their associations.

The <u>League of Women Voter's</u> holds free candidate forums.

AAUW has an issues-based <u>voter's guide</u> and candidate comparison template that members can use to <u>research candidates</u>.

Many advocacy groups do the "research and information gathering" for you and endorse candidates based on issues.

But nothing really beats meeting candidates in person. As Dr. Gina Masullo said, "personal engagement with politicians helps people feel as if they have a stake in politics. These interactions offer a fleeting glimpse of public opinion, as people attempt to convey what they think and feel to people with power to change the policies that influence their lives."

"In a democracy" this open interplay of opinion and policy is the
