Programs

Social citizenship requires that individuals and groups be able to fully take part in the public sphere. In the context of bathrooms and politics, ensuring equal access to restrooms – or denying it to targeted groups – becomes a powerful way for society to define who is a full citizen and to indicate who belongs and who doesn't belong in public spaces. In this talk on November 16, Dr. Chatfield discusses the history of sex-segregated bathrooms as well as her research on state-level policies from the past twenty years that impact gender, social citizenship, and bathroom access.



Dr. Sara Chatfield is an assistant professor of political science at the University of Denver. Her research focuses on American political development, women in politics, and political behavior.

Fundraising

Fundraising within our Branch is intended to support the Branch, smaller donations such as for the Girls Robotics Team, and scholarships.

Branch funding has typically happened through smaller, ongoing efforts, such as Mystery Gift Auction at the December Holiday Party, raffles at meetings, and book sales. Last year we held a "Jewelry Faire" in the Spring.

The main way to raise money for scholarships is through an annual event. For the past three years it has been "An Evening of Art" where artisans, silent auction donations, and sponsors are an integral part of the money raised. It takes a lot of planning and preparation that are not unlike what would be needed for any fundraiser, regardless of the scale or type of event. We have been fortunate to raise significantly more with this annual event than has been raised in past years. Members also no longer need to be the primary source of monetary donations as they often are with branch fundraising.

April: Debbie Dimitri will give a performance as a suffragette. Possibly combine this performance with a pink tea party.


May: Annual meeting and election of officers.

Words matter

With so much misinformation, disinformation, and word salad, word spinning or word "weaving" going on today, the public policy team is taking a close look at our AAUW National <u>Public Policy Priorities</u> to make sure they convey the mission, values, and vision of our members and can be a good guide for us the next two years for our local advocacy work.

You will get a chance to VOTE to approve them in April but, better yet, JOIN in the conversation before the vote! A final version will go to the AAUW National Board at the end of November!!

Our State team sent our comments to the AAUW National Committee hoping to be able to see some significant changes this year.

Define "gender" in 2025 - 2027 terms.

Have you seen the <u>AAUW DEI Toolkit</u>? It is huge! Lots of good information but some of it is outdated.

Add important missing key "words":

LGBTQ, Nonbinary, Transgender Long-term Care, Gender-affirming Care Marital status, Parental status, Family status Economic security for older women

Change outdated phrases:

- separation of church and state vs religion and government
- sexual identity vs gender identity
- . transsexual vs transgender

Clarity terms and usage:

- "end white supremacy"
- · "dependent care"
- "higher education" vs "postsecondary education", "career training",
 "apprenticeship

We will work on updating our <u>state public policy priorities</u> during the month of November and December at our weekly Tuesday noon meetings.
