Items Needed:


- New underwear (all genders, all sizes)


Notes From the Board Meeting

Public Policy Updates and Action

Lobby Day on January 27th was a great success with over 70 members and guests participating in our virtual event. If you missed it, you can view the recording, handouts, and presentations: <u>click-> here</u>

You will learn about our State budget and why we have a 12-billion-dollar deficit and what we can do about it. You can learn about what health advocates are focusing on in 2025. And you can hear from our state LGBTQ Commission about the work they do and the bills they are following this session.

We reviewed the good bills our State leadership is moving forward to strengthen our gender inclusive school policies and support students at risk of not graduating. We heard about bills to strengthen our early learning and childcare programs, protect reproductive and pregnant person rights, support inclusive workplaces including protections for domestic workers. There is also a suite of bill to protect immigrants from coercion and bias in the workplace and prevent unnecessary deportation. You can find the list of Lobby Day bills and Talking Points at our <u>Actions We Take</u> webpage. It also includes a <u>Meet your Legislator Checklist</u> and a link to find you legislators' <u>contact information</u>.

It includes a sample letter that can be sent to your legislators. This is a good time to

reach out to your legislators – as well as local leaders – and let them know you appreciate all the good work they do to keep Washington State a good, safe inclusive community. You can also reach out to Governor Ferguson, our State Attorney General Nick Brown, and all our other State executive team and let them know you support their upholding our Washington State laws that embrace an inclusive, safe, and healthy community for all.
