If you're like me, your head may be spinning with all the executive orders, firings and then re-hirings, and changes in policy with respect to issues we care about.



April 12: our Pink Tea will be held in Woodway Hall. Tickets can be purchased at our March Branch meeting for \$20 or use this link to order via Eventbrite



Public Policy Updates and Action

Lobby Day Follow-up March 12, 7pm Via Zoom

Hear about progress of our priority legislation, the state budget, <u>This Week in Olympia</u> newsletter, and other follow-ups to Lobby Day 2025. <u>Register using -> this link.</u>

Equal Pay Day is March 25 this year.

The day an average woman must work into the next year to achieve the same annual wage as a man.

The current state of the gender pay gap for women did not change much – 83% for full-time, year-round workers and 75% for all workers (including part-time and seasonal).

We also have pay gap data by state and congressional districts.

WA state's average was 79.2% (it was 82% last year) so we dropped by almost 3%!

By Congressional District it ranged from 74% (CD1) to 89% (CD10).

One of our goals this year is to make sure young women know about the gender pay gap and strategies we are working on to close the gap.

One of the policy strategies is to require **salary range transparency**. Laws that require companies to share salary ranges can help reduce pay gaps. See <u>Pay Range Transparency Helps Reduce Gender Wage Gaps</u> National Women's Law Center 2023.

WA state passed a law in 2022 to require salary range transparency in WA state but there is a bill this session in play that would weaken that law: <u>SB 5408</u> Allowing for corrections to wage and salary disclosures. There was an <u>article</u> in the Seattle Times that has some members fuming because it focuses on the lawsuits against employers who don't follow the law.

AAUW continues to be a leader in advocating for equal pay and opportunities for women.

See our 2025 report The Not So Simple Truth: about the gender pay gap.

We will be talking more about the pay gap over the next few months. In a few weeks we should have equal pay awareness <u>calendar dates</u> by race, LGBTQ and Moms.

These are tough times politically as well as socially and economically, and I hope you are all doing ok and taking care of yourselves and your loved ones.
