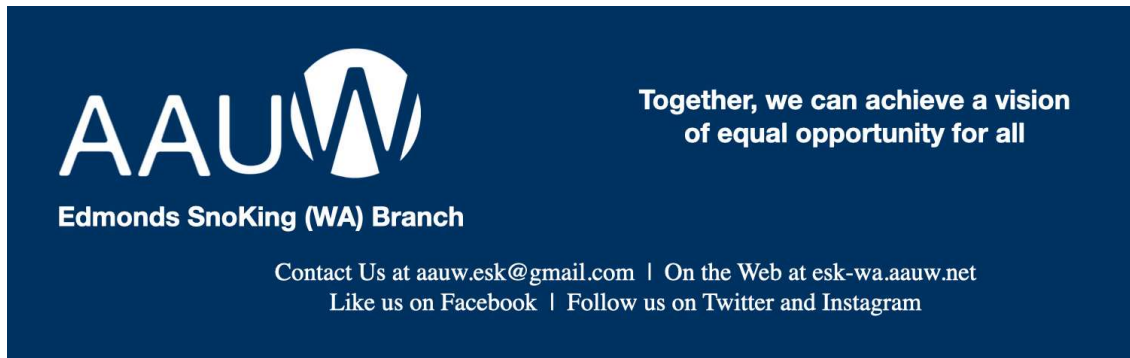


Hello AAUW members.

## President's Message

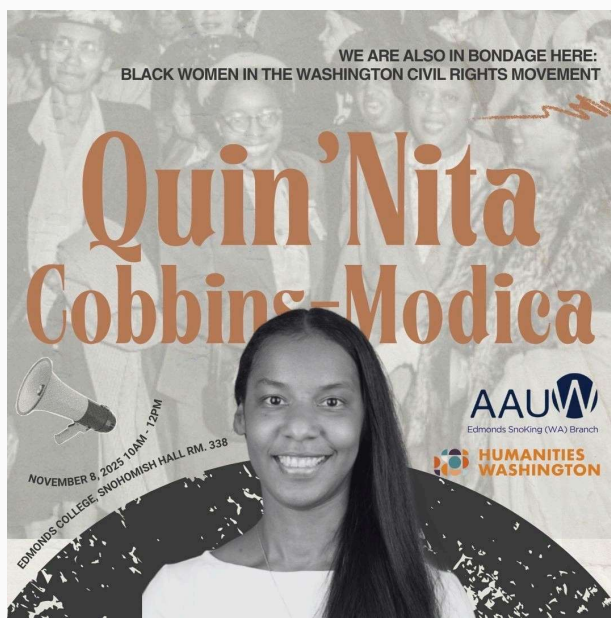

### Notes From the Board Meeting

WSU Everett is now officially an AAUW college affiliate campus and our two representatives are Hayley Larson (Development) and Jess Lorre (Admissions Counselor). So now, Edmonds College and WSU, Everett are both officially affiliated with us.

In November, our Branch will host the Humanities Washington presentation: *"We Are Also in Bondage Here: Black Women in the Washington Civil Rights Movement"* by Quin'Nita Cobbins-Modica, an Assistant Professor of History at the University of California, Santa Cruz.

The profit from the Art Show is expected to be approximately \$8,000. Positive reviews and good feedback were received from several artists.

### **Public Policy Updates and Action**

Many local AAUW members joined one of the numerous October 18 “No Kings” Rallies in Snohomish and King counties after AAUW National encouraged members. The current US Government actions to coerce higher educational institutions to limit student rights and

academic freedom along with actions to reduce or eliminate the student loan programs that open the doors of education to citizens, conflict with AAUW's goals of encouraging higher education as a pathway to economic security and upward mobility for women and girls.

**NATIONAL** Action requested.

The so-called Safeguarding American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act (H.R. 22) passed the U.S. House this Spring. It is now before the U.S. Senate. **This is a dangerous voter suppression bill** that would require every voter to present a paper citizenship document—like a birth certificate or passport—each time they register or re-register. and undermine current methods such as online, mail-in, and automatic voter registration by requiring in-person submission of documents. This will disenfranchise up to **21 million U.S. citizens** due to lack of access to required paperwork. And it would disproportionately harm **people of color, voters with disabilities, older adults, and women**—especially those whose names have changed due to marriage or divorce, adding **costs, confusion, and barriers** to voting. **Tell your senators - Patty Murray and Maria Cantwell: Oppose the SAVE Act and protect fair, accessible elections. Do it easily - [Here](#).**

**STATE** - The State AAUW team continues to meet to monitor legislation and plan for the next legislative session. More next month on this.

**LOCAL** - Local elections are important. In Snohomish County the once in a decade Charter Review Commission is up for election. This is the governing document (like a county constitution) for the county. Each voter gets to select three members to the commission. The LWV has [a panel discussion](#) online and additional information.

Recently I wrote a column titled "Who to Vote for When the Voters Pamphlet is Not Enough" with some additional resources for voting. It is posted on the LWV Snohomish county [Facebook page](#).

And lastly the State Auditor's office has warned that changes at USPS mean that not all mail is postmarked on the day you deposit it in the mailbox. If you have not already mailed your ballot, you either want to

find a ballot box or go into the post office and ask them to postmark it.  
Remember Election Day is Tuesday, November 4.
